Glittering performance of Beauty and the Beast

Magnus Church of England Academy students have put on four glittering performances of Beauty and the Beast Jr, an adaptation for young audiences based on the original Disney story of transformation and tolerance.

Students from year 7 to year 12 joined the double-cast, sharing the performances given to year 5 children from The Kings C of E Primary Academy, and additional performances to fellow students, families and friends.

In all, the set design, props and planning spanned a 5-month period, during which time students used their enrichment lesson, of one hour each week, to smooth out the details before more frequent rehearsals began. The performances



were supported by a large crew of technicians, set, and props teams supporting the cast, including students who hand painted the set. Every member of the cast and crew were gifted a rose pin by Magnus C of E Academy to remember their experience and efforts.

Leanne Phillips is Primary and Community Liaison Officer at Magnus C of E Academy and she said, "Beauty and the Beast has been such a joy to put together with the cast this year. They really understood the roles and got straight into character from the first rehearsal which really helped bring to life the magic in the production.

"We have been rehearsing for 5 months and what a fun filled and action-packed time it has been preparing for the show. We had lots of support from our staff and students this year, we created our own production company helping create set, props, costume, hair and makeup and it was great to see the students' production work up on stage, it felt like a team effort. We are so proud of how hard the cast and crew worked.

"We had some lovely feedback from our audiences, and we are already planning our next production!"

Principal, Anna Martin said the performance was a source of pride for the whole academy. She said, "Our school vision is 'Developing people of good character, who achieve excellence and make a positive contribution to their communities'. This includes helping our young people discover their talents and work towards achieving excellence in these areas. Participating in a school production, whether on or off stage, is a great opportunity to explore talents and develop excellence. Chaplaincy at Magnus

We have had a busy term in the Chaplaincy Department! Sixth Form Faith and Leadership Day:

In February, Sixth Form spent a day off-timetable to fulfil their RE hours. We looked at leadership attributes, personality types, our stories and two sessions looking at life's big questions and unpacking the Holy Spirit. Some students chose to stay late, even though they had a leave school early privilege pass, as they said they gained so much from the day. We're already looking forward to the next one!

Listen Up Conference:

The Listen Up conference is a Diocese conference completely led by young people from different schools around the diocese. Six of our students planned a whole act of worship on the theme of 'Removing the barriers to God's unconditional love'. They led us in sung worship, did the talk, reflection, wrote a spoken word and prayed for everyone. Some primary schools have already asked if they could come and lead at their school! They did us proud with their creativity and authenticity. One of our students then did the key note speech around the topic of making the most of the time we have. His object lessons really hit home and everyone was so complementary of his speaking skills.

Flourish Project:

15 students are now a part of the Flourish Project which is a national scheme looking at what church could look like in school, led by both staff and students. These students meet every week and are working on an outdoor prayer space and worship event. They have already led a whole school act of worship and we can't wait to see this continue and grow.

HOPE: has relaunched! Every week students get a chance to eat, play games and worship together and this term the group have been looking at spiritual gifts and using them in the church. There are three tracks they can choose from: worship, prayer and preaching. The hope is that they'll be leading the whole thing once a term. All students are welcome!

Peer Mentors: Six students have been trained up as peer mentors and will be buddied up after the Easter holidays. Their picture will be around school and their focus is around bullying and settling into school well.

Young Carers: Young Carers have now all had their second annual check in. We'll be putting updates for events on the notice board outside the Chaplains' office if you are interested.

Table Talks: Every Monday, our Flourish Project Lead, Derek, is running Table Talks during the whole of lunch time. The hope is that it facilitates questions of what students believe and encouraging them to know their why to their beliefs.

Enrichment: We are coming to the end of the Games, Gaming and Faith enrichment where students have been exploring questions of faith through games like Minecraft. One student created a church in the shape of a cross with ladders up to the front door. To the right was a kitchen to feed people and offer drinks and to the left was a big sofa. We loved this image! We're finishing this enrichment and have just started the Youth Alpha course with students who have signed up.




Prison Me! No Way!

Year 9 and 10 students got the chance to participate in a Crime Awareness Day with Prison Me! No Way! The day included talks on County Lines, Drug Awareness, Domestic Abuse and Knife Crime and the students got the chance to visit a prison cell.

Students were given the opportunity to have a Q and A with currently serving prisoners, asking a range of brilliant and thought-provoking questions.

The theme of the day was "Choices" to help young people understand the consequences of poor choices, stay safe and know where to turn for help.

Lego with Lasers



On Friday 28th March, our A Level physics students visited the University of Nottingham to take part in a "Lego with Lasers" workshop at the Lakeside Arts centre and have a guided tour of the "Cosmic Titans" exhibition at the Djanogly Gallery.

During the workshop, students constructed a working laser interferometer, with nanometre precision, from Lego and laser pointers -building a small-scale equivalent of the LIGO gravitational waves detector. Assisted by PhD students from the UoN and visiting academics from universities in Brazil and Canada, our students excelled in constructing and testing their models.

Following the workshop, the students toured the Cosmic Titans exhibition, celebrating the International Year of Quantum Science and Technology.

National Careers Week 2025



To celebrate National Careers Week, we held our annual Careers Fair and invited in some ex-Magnus students to talk about their career and apprenticeship journeys.

We kicked off with the Careers Fair and hosted around 20 exhibitors from post-16 and post-18 education and apprenticeship providers, universities and employers. Students were given time to speak to everyone and discuss their options for the future

The event was a huge success and we are looking forward to holding it again next year to further help us guide our students make their future choices.

Our alumni assemblies started with Georgia who talked to students in year 7 about her time at Magnus and her career journey in Early Years Education and beyond.

Next, Kimberley (pictured right) joined us and told year 8 about her career as a solicitor specialising in family law. She discussed how she faced set backs along the way but she persevered and was able to go into the career she wanted. She walked students through a typical work day for her when she's both in court and in the office.

Finally, we were joined by Aaliyah and Sara-Lou who work together teaching young people dance and fitness. Aaliyah told students about her struggles with being dyslexic but how she worked hard to achieve her A Levels at Magnus. Through an exercise involving paper and following instructions,



Sara-Lou taught students that communication is an important tool for them to use when trying to progress in your career.

Magnus Archives - R. Peacock

Throughout this term the Magnus Archives has continued to develop, owing largely to generous donations from many knowing associations with the School, as current or former students, or who just have an interest in Magnus' heritage. It would not be possible, of course, to reflect almost five centuries, since Thomas Magnus made his most generous bequest, in terms of heritage memorabilia, for much has been lost in the mists of time. In the Archives, the Magnus story, as it has survived the years, has been rekindled through available images, exhibits and information. Much is in the form of photographs; some documents have remained intact. We currently have a number of interesting exhibitions and displays. History, especially local history, provides an essential backdrop to present-day culture, and no evidence can be deemed irrelevant. Generations have given us the foundation on which to learn, improve and grow.

Donations of memorabilia, photographs or books, certificates, or other artefacts are always welcome here. Several contributions, large or small, have been gratefully received this year. It likely that much remains tucked away in lofts or cupboards, forgotten, or dismissed as lacking purpose. All such can be offered a useful home here in the Academy, sometimes within a display. Do you have items reflecting our heritage with which you are prepared to part?
