Inspectors issue a glowing SIAMS report for Magnus C of E Academy



We received a glowing report following our latest SIAMS inspection, with the outcome bringing extra cheer during our festivities.

The report states, "The motto of 'Character, Excellence and Community' is lived out through the school's Christian teachings. This provides a clear purpose to the work of this church school. The highly inclusive culture within the school, which stems from the Christian vision, has changed lives. Consequently, students thrive as they discover their God-given uniqueness."

Inspectors said, "The Magnus vision, deeply rooted in bible teachings, drives the school's unwavering commitment to transformational acts that shape lives and inspire purpose for the school community. For example, through the

school's firm belief in everyone's ability to have a fresh start and flourish through perseverance. Even in times of challenge, leaders are guided by their shared purpose to be a community rooted in love. Barriers such as disadvantage are carefully considered and addressed, ensuring that students can flourish."

Mrs Martin said receiving the news during the Christmas period felt like an extra special gift. "I am delighted to share our outstanding SIAMS report with the Magnus community. It is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our students, staff, governors, and the wider school community, -thank you for your continued support and partnership on this journey.

"We are so proud that our incredible school has received the recognition it rightly deserves. Together, we are building a school where every student is valued, challenged, and empowered to live life to the full."

The report said, "Daily inclusive and inspirational opportunities for worship both within and beyond the school day enables students to think deeply and find space. The school is a beacon radiating hope within the wider community. This unique relationship between the school and wider community is transformational. The quality of the religious

education (RE) curriculum is exceptional. As a result, the well-embedded religious and worldviews approach ensures that students take an informed approach to issues of faith and morality."

Commenting on the academy's approach to its vision, justice and responsibility, inspectors said, "The school fosters a culture of care, where supporting and standing up for others is central. Through the Eco-Club, students drive meaningful environmental change. The cadet service empowers them to lead and serve their community. Christian Distinctiveness

We have been busy this half term with SIAMS, all of the different groups we run to support students and help them grow in their faith. The SIAMS report was so encouraging to us to see the impact of the work we are doing.

We've started our **Act of Worship Leaders** group who meet Monday mornings to help plan our whole school act of worships and they are already going to be helping to lead the Christmas Act of Worship. Every month as part of the **Flourish Project**, we have been teaming up with St Mary Magdalene's Church to run a monthly youth worship night, **FUEL**. It's been beautiful to watch people encounter God's presence and grow in confidence in their faith. There were an amazing 28 students both from Magnus and beyond who came. **Fearfully and Wonderfully Made Self-Esteem Group:**

One of our Chaplaincy team is currently doing a degree in youth ministry and theology and has started a self-esteem group as part of her research. Students are learning all about thought-life, the power of thoughts, what God says about them and how this can impact them. Both 1-2-1 mentoring and group work has taken place and has already shown positive outcomes.

Courageous Advocacy:

Our courageous advocacy facilitator has been busy running many different initiatives from our Eco-group to the diversity and equality group to looking after our young carers. This half term we have already achieved our Eco-goals set by the LetsGoZero charity that work with schools to help them be more eco-friendly. We also now have a uniform box to donate old uniform and give it to those who need it and are collecting presents to give to the Salvation Army for their toy giveaway.

There's been a lot of **sporting success** this term with many fixtures taking place! **Year 11 boys rugby team** played in a tournament that took place at Newark Rugby Club, beating local rivals Newark Academy and Sir William Robertson Academy to come in second place overall. The **Year 11 and Year 7 netball teams** both played matches agains The Suthers School - Year 11 beat them 16-7 and the Year 7 girls, who played their first ever match against them, unfortunately lost but showed incredible determination throughout. A special mention goes to Abbie R for her brilliant defending! **Year 8 and 9 netball team** played in a tournament, beating The Suthers School 7-2, and narrowly losing 4-3 against Newark Academy. They also had another match against Suthers and there was so much talent we were able to take two teams! They were a credit to the school and played with incredible determination. The Magnus Archives has continued to build up during the past term. Several old photographs, or copies have been added to the collection, but there is room for more should anybody have memorabilia that he or she would like to donate. Simultaneously, records of present Magnus events in the form of programmes, brochures, images, news cuttings, etc. . . deserve to be retained for future posterity and comparison. Magnus strategies, facilities and appearances have changed greatly over the years and continue to change with the march of educational outlook and curriculum. This is right and proper, but there is much to be learned from the past. Life becomes increasingly complex and there is more to be catered for than used to be the case. Here, on the Earp Avenue site, the physical buildings alone bear witness to seven generations of development since opening in 1910. Yet all twentieth-century Magnusians will recognise the fundamental unchangeability of the foundation that launched them into the start of adult life. Others, who do not have roots in Newark, find it fascinating to make comparisons on a 'then' and 'now' basis. Remember that Magnus was a 'boys only' Grammar School until 1976, and that a far smaller precursor existed in Appleton Gate from 1529 until 1910.

All, past and present students, parents and grandparents of former students, or non-students are welcome to come and see what the Archives holds and, where possible, to help build up the collection.



Music Celebration in Southwell

The SNMAT Music Celebration took place at Southwell Minster in October and involved schools across the trust. Students from Magnus took part in the event along with Mrs Thacker.


